

November Meeting

Speciation in Birds

Dr. Trevor Price

For as long as it has been appreciated that one species can split into two, birds have been at the center of speciation theories. Birds are easy to observe in the field and have been widely studied, making them one of the best taxonomic groups with which to review the importance of ecological factors in speciation. But birds have more than that to offer. In particular, they are an excellent group with which to investigate the role of behavior, especially those factors involved in choice of mate and the process of sexual selection. It turns out that the choice of a mate is a critical feature of speciation. Dr. Price, Professor of Biology, University of Chicago, has done extensive research in this area. His current research focus is on the determinants of bird species diversity along the Himalayas, notably the question of why there are twice as many species in the eastern Himalayas as the west. Join with Dr. Price to discover how bird species split into subspecies and subspecies become species in his fascinating and lavishly illustrated talk.

Greene Valley Hawkwatch October Summary

After a slow September migration picked up the pace a bit. We did well with the large winged species (Eagles, Ospreys, and Vultures) and the Falcons. Accipiters, Harriers, and Buteos were still well below average. We ended with 1498 birds for October which was above the 12 year average for the month. We recorded our 40,000th bird on 10/15, a Turkey Vulture. The raptor highlight was our 2nd record for Prairie Falcon on the 17th. Non-raptors highlights included American White Pelicans, a gathering of 42 American Crows, and our almost annual sighting of Anhingas (2) on 10/10. We are looking forward to an excellent November as hawk watchers to the north are reporting pretty good numbers of Northern Goshawks, Rough-legged Hawks, and Golden Eagles. Nominees for the 2018 Board of Directors

The DuPage Birding Club provides many opportunities for members to come together to learn from a wide variety of speakers, to improve birding skills, to make and renew birding friendships, and to make a difference to local communities. Volunteers make all of this possible. At our club's evening meeting on November 9, we will elect the Board of Directors for 2018. We are pleased to present the following members for leadership positions on the Board:

Vice President, Pat Eggleston: Pat was given a set of Audubon Bird books (which she still has) by her grandmother when she was 10. Though she had no one to help her, Pat did learn birds in her upstate New York area. She still remembers being awed by a Great Blue Heron that was in a marsh near her home. After leaving home for college, Pat didn't bird for many years, picking it up again in her forties when she lived in California. Since she lived close to the ocean, she mostly learned shorebirds. Pat moved to the Chicago area in the mid-'80s, but didn't get into birding until she moved to Wheaton. She doesn't remember how she heard about it, but one spring morning Pat went to Elsen's Hill and was walking along, looking for birds. That morning changed her whole birding life as she met Muriel Smith. As Muriel had done with many new birders, she "took Pat under her wings." Pat and several others were frequently invited to Muriel's house for "study sessions." Pat was hooked and has stayed interested in birding since. Pat thinks that happened about 20 years ago. At that time, she learned to bird by sound, but as she has "aged" Pat is learning to bird all over again—this time by sight. She guesses birding is always a learning process—one that is always a pleasure. Pat can't imagine a more interesting way to spend her time than birding. It even has influenced her choice of where to live. When Pat returned from living in Arizona 2 years ago, she chose a townhouse that backs up to a forest preserve prairie area. She spends many mornings on her balcony with her binoculars and scope. Elsen's Hill is also less than a mile away. Birding clearly is an integral part of Pat's life. She has had two careers—first, as a preschool and kindergarten teacher, with nature a huge part of her curriculum. She then got a PhD in education and spent many years training teachers. Pat went back to school, obtained another degree in psychology, is a licensed psychologist, and spent 10 years teaching others to be psychologists.

Treasurer, Bonnie Graham: Bonnie has been a casual birder for about 9 years, after her daughters gave her a Field Guide to Birds in 2008. She became a more serious birder after retirement 6 years ago. She has been a DBC member for 5.5 years and went on her first DBC Field Trip in July 2012, where she saw her "spark" bird, a Common Yellowthroat, which continues to be her favorite bird. Her favorite place to bird is The Morton Arboretum, where she has seen 123 species. Bonnie is also an amateur photographer and has had 11 bird photos published in the Daily Herald and 3 in *BirdWatching* Magazine. Bonnie is wrapping up her 1-year position on the 2017 Board as a Director.

Recording Secretary, Steve Constantelos: Steve grew up in DuPage County and became interested in birding back in the mist of the early '90s, witnessing springtime street fights between Robins, tracking Pileated Woodpeckers, dodging Mockingbirds, and monitoring Bluebird boxes while living in Virginia. A Christmas Bird Count back home in DuPage at that time sealed the deal. He now participates in bird collision monitoring, bird banding, and plain old birding, enjoying Christmas Bird Counts at Salt Creek and Wolf Road Prairie, and trying to spot Brown Creepers amid mixed foraging flocks at Greene Valley Forest Preserve, Seager Park, Lyman Woods, and his parents' backyard. Steve's current project: sparrows.

Director, Glenn Perricone: In 2011, while volunteering at the Willowbrook Wildlife Center, Glenn Perricone was introduced to the world of birdwatching by Naturalist Ron Skleney after an early-April encounter with a Northern Parula. Since then, Glenn has earned a BA in Biology from Elmhurst College, followed in Ron's footsteps by becoming a Naturalist for the Forest Preserve District of DuPage County, and has dived head first into birding. Traveling much of the eastern United States, but more so, delving deep into DuPage County's local birdwatching hotspots, Glenn has already added over 300 bird species to his life list. In 2013, Glenn became a DBC Field Trip Leader and since then has led over 40 club field trips, including his unique monthly 'Know Your Neighborhood' series. Whether conducting bird surveys at Fermilab or aural bird counts at Pratt's Wayne Woods, or leading children on education programs at Fullersburg Woods, Glenn is most at home when outside enjoying the birds.

Director, Joan Campbell: Joan has been birding since 1979, when her son brought home a pinecone feeder from Sunday school, right after they had relocated to St. Louis. They were staying in a temporary residence with a tiny little deck, where she hung up his feeder so as not to hurt his feelings. The next day, a woodpecker came to the feeder, and from the moment she was finally able to identify it as a Downy, she was hooked. For about 30 years, most of her birding was at backyard feeders, plus a few side trips during vacations. Joan attended birding symposiums, but until 2009, when she was introduced to the fall migration walks at Fullersburg and Willowbrook, she never birded with a group. During a Willowbrook outing, Ron Skleney gave her a calendar with information about Cantigny bird walks, and in spring 2010 she became an active participant on those, as well. Joan says birding with others has had a gigantic impact on her skills and enjoyment. Prior to that, she didn't know even one other person that was interested in birds except Jenny Vogt, whom she met by accident at one of the Midwest Birding Symposiums back in the mid-'90s. Her "patch" is Lyman Woods, where she leads DBC Walks and does breeding bird surveys. But her favorite place to bird is Sanibel Island, specifically, Ding Darling. Joan was a member of DBC many years back but dropped out because she didn't really know anyone. She re-joined several years ago, and has served on the Field Trips Committee for the past 2 years. Because the club has offered so much to her, Joan is ready to continue supporting the club by serving as a Director.
